- Any questions that you have.
- Other family members are welcome.

When do I make another appointment?

 If you need another appointment, we will schedule it before you leave.

Will my baby keep seeing their regular pediatrician?

 Yes, Baby Steps will <u>NOT</u> take the place of your baby's regular doctor.

WHO gets referred to Baby Steps?

All babies who have risk when they are born (like prematurity).

WHAT is Baby Steps?

- Baby Steps is a program for high-risk babies.
- Baby Steps will NOT take the place of your baby's regular doctor.
- Your baby will have at least 1 appointment, which will include:
- A visit with a doctor and other specialists.
- Referrals to helpful outreach services (food stamps, WIC, Early Intervention, and housing)
- Baby Steps will send a report to your baby's doctor.



HOW can Baby Steps help your baby?

Pediatrician:

- Check your baby's growth.
- Monitor any medications your baby is taking.
